

did not fall short for Akkodis ASP Team. No fewer than 55 entrants took off on the 7km of the Ardennes rollercoaster, and the fight raged on. Despite some issues during the qualifying sessions that forced the Pro-AM leaders Jim Pla and Jean-Luc Beaubelique (#87) to start from the back of the grid in both races, Akkodis ASP Team did not lose sight of their goals and conserved the lead in the Pro-AM and AM championships (teams and drivers). Two wonderful podiums in Race 2 came to conclude this Belgian weekend with a third step in Pro-AM for Simon Gachet and Eric Debard (#81) and the third step in AM for Mauro and Benjamin Ricci (#61). In the Top 10 AM in Friday's race, Christophe Bourret and Pascal Gibon (#53) unfortunately did not cross the finish line Saturday after a mechanical issue. After a summer break, the championship will restart (for the before-last round) in Germany, at the Hockenheim track, on the 3rd and 4th of September.


Held during the weekend of the 24 Hours of Spa, this fourth round of the GT4 European Series





there was only one free practice session left to allow the drivers to take their marks on a layout that has seen quite a few changes over the winter, namely with the return of gravel traps in strategic locations. It was an ideal temperature of 23°C for the qualifying sessions. The first session, interrupted with 3'30 to go after a crash, allowed Simon Gachet (#81) to set the second best time in Pro-AM and overall. Disrupted by electrical troubles, Jim Pla (#87) had to be content with the 9th time in Pro-AM. Benjamin

Ricci (#61) was in the Top 5 AM (P35) and Christophe Bourret (#53) P12 in the category.





Eric Debard did the mistake but the whole crew was penalized. Jim Pla for his part was at the back of the grid, the #87 having been penalised for changing their battery at the end of Q1 (to resolve their

electronical issues), and all the times before the change were cancelled.


Race 1 - The #87 held onto their championship lead


Although he had set the second best time, Simon Gachet had to start from 6th place. This was due to

having gone too fast in the pitlane during Q2, which also gave Eric Debard 3 Behaviour Warning Points.

The start of this first race was very impressive with a field of 54 cars. Simon Gachet threw himself into the fight and took quickly one, then three positions. There were a few contacts in the field that animated the fights, while Jim Pla (#87) was already in warrior mode, having gone from 53rd to 35th place in two laps! Benjamin Ricci (#61) held onto their 4th place in AM and Christophe Bourret (#53) navigated in the Top 12.



The restart took place with one lap to go. This final passage was intense and the fight was fierce. In the


end, Simon Gachet (#81) crossed the line in P3 Pro-AM after having taken 29 places, and got a nice
